Projects

Prior to the trip, we asked the team to stay flexible with the work assignments as we were not sure of the projects at hand. We are so grateful that the team was truly flexible and plugged in to work wherever they were required.

Security Camera



One of our main goal was to bring additional security to the orphanage. Sylvie and Angele are currently living a mile away from the orphanage, since the guest house and their home at the orphanage are still under construction. The camera will give them the ability to monitor the orphanage without being there. Unfortunately, since there is no reliable power and no wifi, they wont be able to use remote live viewing. They will have the ability to rewind if they suspect something happened. There has been theft at the orphanage by some workers. We hope the cameras will be a deterrent.

Painting

The children moved into the orphanage as soon as construction completed. Another one of goal was to make the orphanage more comfortable and pleasing for the children. We took on the task to make the bathrooms more presentable and safer by removing mold and mildew. The bathrooms were scraped to remove mold and old cement. We then primed the walls with cement dry lock, followed by painting with oil based paint. The colors were chosen by the children. Of course, pink for girls and blue for boys. We completed dry locking the girls and boys bathroom but had to leave a small part of the girls bathroom bare because we ran out of pink paint. Buying paint is a two day event since they now live an hour and $\frac{1}{2}$ from the city. One day to place an order and another to pick them up. For the boys room, we ranget of time to paint over the dry lock. Angele plans to can plete the painting when the next team arrives on Feb.



Projects

Tiling of floor



The floors on the patio where the kids play is bare cement. The kids with cerebral palsy would crawl on it and end up having dust all over them. We decided to tile this floor. Tiling the floor became our most tedious task! Cement was used as an adhesive for the tiles. The cement was carefully mixed by hand, then spread on the floor. Then the tiles were placed strategically and grooves were made between the tiles. Only a small area can be worked at one time since the cement will dry quickly. After all the tiles were placed, a yellow cement coat is placed on top. After that dries, each individual tiles are scraped clean. The project was rewarding because as soon as it was completed the children played on the floor without getting dusty.

Construction of new house



Mixing cement by hand is hard work! The Canadian team that was in Haiti prior to us completed the foundation and the 4 walls of Sylvie's house. We were dedicated in finishing the floors of both bedrooms and stucco all the interior and exterior walls. But with a tight budget and lack of a cement mixer, we only completed 1 floor, stuccoed 1 exterior floor and 4 interior walls of 1 room.

Rocks were carried from one site to another where the cement was mixed using a wheel barrow. Water were transported using 5 gallon buckets. Mixed cement were also wheel barrowed into the rooms for the floors and the walls.
